Autumn Rose Miskweminanocauq (Raspberry Star

Woman) Williams was born and raised on the Shinnecock Reservation in Southampton, New York. She graduated from Virginia Commonwealth University with a Bachelor of Science in Mass Communications and a Minor in Business. Being immersed in her culture from birth has given her pride in her Black and Indigenous heritage that is the foundation for the work she does today.

When Williams was crowned Miss Teen Shinnecock at the age of 16, it allowed her the opportunity to travel across the United States and learn about the indigenous experience outside of her Shinnecock community. Following college, she was crowned Miss Native American USA 2017/2018 and began yet another journey to learn more about her people. Being Miss Teen Shinnecock, attending college, and being Miss Native American USA were important growing periods of her life that allowed her to learn about the world and people around her as well as look within. After completing her reign as Miss Native American USA, Williams was signed to STATE Management as a plus size model. Plus size modeling is a way Autumn Rose faces her body image issues head-on and continues her message of self-love and empowerment!

Williams utilized her skillset in her communications career to advocate for accurate representation and inclusivity of Indigenous communities. Williams worked for her tribe, the Shinnecock Nation, as a Communications Manager to ensure her community was up to date with tribal politics, events and news. She has worked with the Administration for Native Americans to support Indigenous language preservation and revitalization within the lower 48, Alaska, and across the Pacific Region, including Hawaii, American Sāmoa, Guam and the Northern Mariana Islands. Williams has worked with ICF Next as a Multicultural Communications Specialist where she supported the organization in understanding Indigenous communities and building healthy relationships.

With 14 years of public speaking, and 6 years of Public Relations Williams continues to educate and bring awareness to the topics that are dear to her, such as Afro-Indigenous culture, social justice awareness, body positivity and mental health.

A Long Talk About the Uncomfortable Truth

"A Long Talk" is an anti-racism activation experience designed to expose participants to a level of truth about the duration, violence, and intentionality of the systems of oppression that have existed since the inception of the United States. It is an open, honest discussion designed to explore and give voice to the uncomfortable truth of our shared history. It is an ongoing conversation which serves as a catalyst for creating a culture of individual change agents and collective anti-racism activism.



The purpose of this work is to end racism and dismantle systemic oppression in America by energizing, activating, and empowering allies in the pursuit of our shared purpose. We will do this by engaging in an ongoing conversation focused on truth, understanding, and problem solving, leading to individual and cooperative activism. In essence, the experience is an honest conversation about how we can all do more than just being personally "not racist."

They have conducted this experience with over 13,000 people over the last 3 years and have received a tremendous amount of positive feedback. We invite you to sessions expertly designed to engage in constructive, reflective conversations, where participants are asked to listen, participate, and practice effective anti-racism in a

supportive and facilitated setting. At the end of this experience, participants will be able to make connections between American history and its current reality; use the CPR Protocol to challenge racist comments and beliefs; and identify and overcome internal and external obstacles which may hinder living as an active anti-racist.

Liberation Embodied: An Invitation to Return 'Home'

Our human collective is in the midst of chaos. Mainstream media (and social media) feeds us stories of hopelessness, polarization, and despair that stoke our fears. This fear often becomes a distraction from our innate power as creative creators of our human experience. In other words, we have been systematically programmed out of our bodies, minds, and spirits in service of further dehumanizing ourselves and each other. However, with a willingness to return 'home' to our individual and collective humanity, we can recreate the narrative for our lives and the human collective. In this workshop, Dr. Reuben will introduce the Cycle of Liberation as a resource to inform individual, interpersonal, and institutional liberation. Participants will be invited to practice elements of individual and collective liberation with the intent to return 'home' to the most authentic expression of individual and collective humanity. Participants will: 1) learn about the Cycle of Liberation, 2) practice the expression of liberation in the individual and collective bodies, 3) develop skills for liberation in the individual, interpersonal, and institutional contexts.

This opportunity was made available through the Michael and Nancy Chicola International Professional Development Schools Consortium, whose goal is to provide opportunities for teacher candidates to globalize their understanding and experience of education through international study and travel.

Biographies

Bonita R. Durand, Ph.D. has been named interim president by the SUNY Board of Trustees. Durand will serve in this role until the appointment of a permanent president.

Durand retired in 2018 after 22 years of service to SUNY Buffalo State, where she served as chief of staff and secretary to the Buffalo State College Council. Durand served under five presidents at Buffalo State during her tenure. In addition, she was a graduate faculty member in the university's Higher Education Administration Department, where she taught courses on the history of American higher education and strategic planning and finance in higher education.

Durand provided leadership to countless committees and working groups at Buffalo State, including the Middle States accreditation steering committee, the presidential inauguration support committees, the facilities master planning committee, and the presidential search advisory committees. She has also served as the faculty adviser for the collegiate chapter of the National Council of Negro Women and the campus adviser for the Gamma Kappa Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Inc.

An active member of the Western New York community, Durand has dedicated her time to numerous organizations across the city and region.

Dr. Andrew I. Hashey is an Chair and Associate Professor in the Exceptional Education Department at SUNY Buffalo State University. In his K-12 teaching career, Dr. Hashey taught in classrooms serving students experiencing significant behavioral and emotional difficulties. His beliefs about teaching and learning are rooted in the tenets of Universal Design for Learning (UDL) and in the power of positive and proactive approaches to supporting the growth of all learners. Dr. Hashey's recent research examines how video-enhanced performance feedback can support pre-service teachers' acquisition and implementation of evidence-based practices. Other scholarly interests include self-regulation, high-leverage practices (HLPs), and school-university partnerships.

Chef Darian Bryan is a Jamaican chef bringing the heat to Buffalo, NY. He is a Food Network winner and has also been featured on CBS News, ESPN, The Jamaican Observer, The Gleaner, TVJ, and more. He arrived in the States in 2012 and has quickly risen to the spotlight through his pop-up fine dining dinners in surprising and unusual locations, private dinners and meal prep for Buffalo's favorite NFL players, and his block-long lines at his Jamaican pop-up events titled "Jerk Hut". Chef Darian specializes in everything extra, from his signature fedora hats and chef jacket styles to his jewelry, to his colossal surf and turf. He recently opened a new dining concept, a boutique for chef services. The boutique allows the Chef to focus on his mission, redefining the chef, bringing them from the back of the house to the front, with each dining party centered around his cooking. Chef Darian believes that chefs are rock stars and should be celebrated as such, their food makes people happy, and they should feel and see that love

too. He opened his second restaurant this summer called Bratts Hill, an ode to the hill he grew up on in the Jamaica countryside and it will feature upscale Jamaican fusion cuisine. Through all his success, he represents Jamaica to the fullest and loves to merge his Caribbean cuisine with all his fine dining dishes, hence the nickname, "The Fancy Jerk"

Chef Donald Schmitter specializes in the culinary aspects of hospitality, based on his many years of experience in the field. In addition to teaching catering, baking, and advanced food courses he also serves as the faculty advisor to the student special events catering club. He serves as the Lab Coordinator for the Hospitality Department. A current member of the American Culinary Federation of WNY and a Certified Culinary Educator, he began his career after graduating from culinary school by completing an ACF Apprenticeship under William Moser (Hilton Hotels) and Norman Hart at Brookfield Country Club. He went on to become an ACF Certified Chef de' Cuisine from 1998-2003 while working as an Executive Sous Chef at Buffalo Hilton, Adam's Mark Hotel, and The Glen Iris Inn (Rich Products).

He was also the Executive Chef at the Red Coach Inn in Niagara Falls while completing his graduate degree in Career and Technical Education at Buffalo State, before becoming a member of the faculty in the Hospitality and Tourism Department.

Donn Youngstrom joined the faculty at Buffalo State in 1994 following an extensive theatrical career. After receiving a bachelor's degree in history from Lewis & Clark College, he studied acting at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts/West. He began his career acting and directing in semi-professional theaters in LA and later Seattle. He relocated to New York City, where he joined CSC Rep, a classical repertory company. In 1984 he played the lead in Comus directed by Donald Savage as part of a Milton Festival at Buffalo State. There he met Donna and Dennis McCarthy, as well as Horace (Hank) Mann. At the urging of Dr. Savage and Dr. Mann, Donn completed a master's in fine arts in directing at Brooklyn College. He subsequently taught as a Lecturer at East Carolina University for four years before returning to New York City as an adjunct professor. In 1994 he was invited by the Chair of the Theater Department, Donna McCarthy, to return to Buffalo State, this time initially as a full-time temporary faculty and later tenured faculty member. Mr. Youngstrom retired in 2018. As a member of the Buffalo State faculty, Mr. Youngstrom left a lasting impression on countless students, in his classes and as a director of 22 student productions. He served as chair of the Theater Department and was a member of the Faculty Senate.

Drew Kahn is a Distinguished Service Professor at SUNY Buffalo State where he has taught acting, devised theater (President's Award for Excellence in Teaching/SUNY) and directed productions (Kennedy Center Award) for 25 years. He taught K-12 populations for 10 years previous to his work in higher education. He is the Founding Director of The Anne Frank Project, a multi-layered social justice

initiative at SUNY Buffalo State that utilizes the wisdom of Anne Frank as a springboard for the examination of genocide and intolerance through the lens of story and performance.

He presents and teaches internationally on the universal language of theater and the intersection of story, conflict resolution and community building—most recently in Rwanda, Kenya, Switzerland, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Burma, Viet Nam, Morocco, New Zealand, Greece, Croatia and Turkey (Toby Ticktin Back Award for Holocaust Education, Community Leader Award, National Federation for Just Communities). Professor Kahn has extensive acting experience in professional theater (Andre' DeShields' original cast of Saint Tous), feature film (Paramount Pictures' Necessary Roughness) as well as several television and commercial credits.

In Buffalo, New York, he was the host of WKBW-TV's (ABC) AM Buffalo for six years, hosted the WNED (PBS) documentary Saving a Landmark: The Darwin Martin House (National Telly Award), and has numerous local stage credits including In a Dark, Dark House, Lobby Hero, A Cat On A Hot Tin Roof and Baltimore Waltz (ArtVoice Artie Award). Michael Mandolfo is a visual artist based in Buffalo, New York. Perception is a common theme in his work. Upon receiving his bachelor's degree in photography from the University at Buffalo in 1985, Mandolfo has received a multitude of awards and exhibited across New York over the last few decades. His work has also appeared in Times Square, at destination hotels in many US cities including New York City and Las Vegas, and as far away as Buenos Aries, Argentina and Tokyo, Japan. His work explores coexisting cultures in America as he focuses on discovering ways elements of culture are able to be expressed as a unifying force rather than a dividing one. His subjects may include one's individual perception, as well as cultural perception both from within and outside one's culture.

Mandolfo is also a partner of Forest Productions & Photography, Inc. – a commercial photography and video studio specializing in creating marketing and advertising media for corporate and institutional clients. The work created by both Mandolfo and Forest Productions & Photography, Inc., produces compelling imagery. Most recently, Mandolfo has transitioned his natural ability with still images into moving pictures through his video work. When not photographing on location, he creates his artwork in his 4,500 square foot studio in Buffalo, New York.

Muhammad Zaman is a visual artist who specializes in Arabic calligraphy. His works are predominantly acrylic or mixed media on canvas, wood, and paper. His technique transforms the written script of three languages--English, Bangla, and Arabic-- into a new script that is distinctly his own. It takes elements from each of these languages which have significant personal meaning for Zaman: Bangla is his first language as a native of Bangladesh, English is the language of his home in the U.S., and Arabic is the language of his religion, Islam. His script is deeply inspired by ancient calligraphic practices, and incorporates modern and urban techniques and influences. In Zaman's works, he layers words and full messages about peace, unity, and understanding. The colors he chooses tend to capture the tone and energy of his intended messages. Because of the nearly readable quality of his works, they have been described as a "scavenger hunt" wherein the viewer becomes an active participant in decoding or filling in the message. Thus, his works are simultaneously abstract, interactive, and conceptual. Zaman was influenced by the artist, eL Seed and his idea to create unity for people from varying backgrounds, ethnicities, and religions. Zaman's artistic goal is to inspire people, and for them to share the same place and learn from each other in harmony and mutual understanding. Although his works contain characters from three different languages, there is always at least one recognizable word represented in each language. This sparks curiosity across audiences to decode the message, leading to a deeper connection with his art. By 2012, Zaman started to do calligraphy at a

Sophia Veffer, a survivor of the Nazi campaign that orchestrated the systematic slaughter of more than six million European Jews during World War II, was born in Amsterdam, Holland, in 1929. Her father was a stamp dealer and the family lived in a middle-class neighborhood where Veffer attended school with Anne Frank. Veffer became a special education teacher, receiving her bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of Buffalo and her master's degree in special education from Buffalo State College. She also raised three sons, all of whom are now successful attorneys. Veffer began publicly sharing her story several years later. She has taught thousands of students and young adults the important lessons of the Holocaust and other mass atrocities. In January 2006, Veffer received the National Conference for Community and Justice Brotherhood/Sisterhood Award for outstanding leadership in promoting goodwill and understanding in the community. That same year she was contacted by Drew Kahn, SUNY Distinguished Service Professor, who requested her assistance with his theater production of The Diary of Anne Frank and became a founding member of the Anne Frank Project. Sophia is a past president of the Women of Studio Arena Theater and the Holocaust Resource Center of Buffalo where she currently serves on its Executive Board. In addition, Sophia serves on the Advisory Committee of the Jewish Repertory Theatre of Western New York. In May 2019, she was named an honorary doctor of humane letters by the State University of New York.

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
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
